According to figures released today by the Maritime Provinces Higher Education Commission, tuition fees paid by undergraduate arts and science students in Maritime universities in 2013-2014 increased between 2.1 and 8.8 per cent over last year while the inflation rate was 1.3 per cent for July.

Commission CEO, Mireille Duguay, said: "For most students, the price of tuition and additional mandatory fees like student association, athletic and campus renewal fees are top-of-mind when it comes to adding up the costs of education. The tables released today by the Commission are a useful tool for students and their parents in working out some of these basic costs."

Maritime university tuition fees vary by institution, now ranging between \$5,360 and \$7,270. The additional mandatory fees paid by students also vary considerably across universities, and in the Maritimes range between \$229 and \$1,108.

In New Brunswick, tuition fees range between \$5,379 and \$7,245, increasing between 2.1 and 8.8 per cent over last year.

In Nova Scotia, undergraduate tuition fee increases were capped by government at three percent, and fees range between \$6,000 and \$7,270.

In Prince Edward Island, tuition costs \$5,360, up \$210, or four percent from the previous year.

The tuition fees reported by the Commission reflect those advertised on institutional websites. Provincial tuition rebates and bursaries are not deducted from the tuition fees.

In New Brunswick, tuition fees range between \$5,379 and \$7,245, an increase of between 2.1 and 8.8 per cent over last year.

In Nova Scotia, fees range between \$6,000 and \$7,270, up by 2.9 to 3.0 percent compared to last year.

In Prince Edward Island, tuition fees increased four per cent over last year and now costs \$5,360.

The tuition fees reported by the Commission reflect those advertised on institutional websites. Provincial tuition rebates and bursaries are not deducted from the tuition fees.

Commission CEO, Mireille Duguay said that the cost of tuition and other fees are top-of-mind for Maritime students and their families. The information now available on the Commission's website will help them work out some basic costs of education.
