
## IN MARITIME HIGHER EDUCATION

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## **UNIVERSITY ENROLMENT - 2014-2015**

In 2014-15, **68,427** students were enrolled in Maritime universities, down 1.8% overall since the previous year. After two years of declines, total enrolment in the region has returned to 2009-10 levels. While the statistics vary in each of the three provinces, important underlying trends are common to all: the composition of the student body is evolving considerably, driven primarily by an increase in out-of-region and international students which have been offsetting declining numbers of Maritime residents. University participation among Maritimers has been steadily declining over the past decade<sup>A</sup>, reaching 22.0% by 2014-15 (which is below the 1992-93 level of 22.5%). Across the Maritimes, these changes are accompanied by shifts in academic program preferences away from the humanities.

- Prince Edward Island, unique among the three provinces, posted a one-year increase in total enrolment of 1.4% to 4,272 students (+7.0% over 10 years). Like its neighbours in the region, it also saw a decrease in local students (-5.5% since last year, -13.0% over 10 years), but recruitment from outside the province was more than sufficient to offset the local student decline: the number of students from other Maritime provinces increased 10.8% and other Canadians went up 20.2%. International enrolment increased 18.5% since last year. Like the other two provinces, academic program preferences have been shifting. Enrolment in Humanities programs dropped 12.9%, while Education enrolment increased 22.3%. Prince Edward Island is about to enter a prolonged period of population decline among 18-24 year olds which will likely impact the number of Islanders enrolling in university.
- New Brunswick universities saw a 5.2% one-year drop in total enrolment to 20,118 students (-18.1% over 10 years). The province is well into a demographic decline as its 18-24 year-old population decreased 7.6% between 2004 and 2014<sup>B</sup>, and is projected to decrease by another 16% by 2025<sup>C</sup>. Home province university participation rates declined by 2.8 percentage points over 10 years. These two trends together led to a sizeable enrolment drop among New Brunswick residents (-5.9% since last year, -23.5% over 10 years). For the first time, enrolment declines were observed across the student body: there were 1.8% fewer students from elsewhere in Canada and 5% fewer international students than a year ago, after years of international enrolment growth. Both undergraduate (-4.8%) and graduate (-8.5%) enrolment levels decreased. The fields of study impacted the most by these downward trends were *Humanities* (-13.4%), *Education* (-10.1%), and *Business* (-8.0%).
- Nova Scotia experienced a one-year total enrolment decrease of 0.4% to 44,037 students (-0.7% over 10 years), largely driven by the 3.1% decrease in the number of Nova Scotia residents (-18.5% over 10 years). The number of Canadian students from outside Nova Scotia saw zero or near-zero growth. While international enrolment increased 7.0%, it was not enough to offset the slide in local student enrolment. Undergraduate (-0.3%) and graduate (-0.9%) enrolments decreased largely in *Humanities* (-8.9%), *Education* (-7.4%) and *Agriculture* (-9.8%) programs. Looking to the near future, demographic projections show that Nova Scotia's population of 18-24 year olds is expected to decrease 18% by 2025<sup>c</sup>, this will likely mean a continuing decline in the number of Nova Scotians in the province's universities.


