STUDENT BACKGROUND, TIME-TO-DEGREE, AND GRADUATE OUTCOMES

How do student background and time-to-degree affect graduate outcomes?

Previous research shows that many factors can affect the time it takes to complete a degree, such as switching fields of study or institutions. New research¹ concludes that parents' educational level influences the time it takes graduates to complete their degree- but only through the interaction with other factors:



63% of Maritime university graduates completed their bachelor's degree² in 4 years or less.









60% of Maritime university graduates **borrowed to finance their first degree**, with an **average debt of** \$31,140¹








